STATEMENT BY THE CABINET SECRETARY THE NATIONAL TREASURY AND PLANNING

Kenya's long term development blue-print, Kenya Vision 2030, is in its third implementation phase under the Third Medium Term Plan (MTP III) 2018-2022. A total of 28 MTP III Sector Plans have concurrently been prepared through 25 MTP Working Groups and three (3) Thematic Working Groups. The Plans provide in detail policies, programmes and projects to be implemented in each sector for the period 2018-2022. The Plans also incorporate policies, programmes and projects necessary for the effective implementation of the "Big Four" initiatives namely: manufacturing and agro-processing; food and nutrition security; universal health coverage and affordable housing. Ongoing flagship projects and other priority programmes and projects carried forward from the previous Medium Term Plans will also be implemented. The Sector Plans have also mainstreamed key priorities outlined in the Manifesto of the Jubilee Government.

The MTP III and the Sector Plans have been prepared through a participatory and inclusive process involving representatives from the government, development partners, private sector, Civil Society, NGOs, organizations representing vulnerable groups, faith-based organizations and professional associations, among others and in line with the constitutional requirements.

The Sector Plans detail specific programmes and projects for implementation during the plan period, 2018-2022. The programmes and projects outlined in these plans will be implemented in close consultation and collaboration with county governments and in line with the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution. The Public Private Partnerships (PPPs) framework will be the vehicle through which the private sector will contribute to the implementation of programmes and projects highlighted in the plans.

The County Integrated Development Plans, County Spatial Plans and Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) Strategic Plans (2018-2022) will be aligned to the MTP III and the National Spatial Plan. Implementation of these plans will also be linked to the Results-Based Management Framework through Performance Contracts and Staff Performance Appraisal System.

A robust monitoring and evaluation framework will be put in place. In this regard, National Integrated Monitoring and Evaluation System (NIMES), County Integrated Monitoring and Evaluation System (CIMES) and the electronic Project Monitoring Information System (e-ProMIS) will be fully integrated with other governmental financial systems. This will ensure effective tracking of implementation of programmes and projects and also boost Public Investment Management.

In conclusion, I would like to appreciate the respective Cabinet Secretaries, Chief Administrative Secretaries, Principal Secretaries, staff in the MDAs and all those involved in the preparation of the Sector Plans for their valuable inputs. In addition, I commend staff from State Department for Planning led by Principal Secretary, Planning for the effective coordination of the MTP III preparation process.

The population, Urbanization and Housing Sector Plan is in line with the Third Medium Term Plan (MTP III 2018-2022) of the Kenya Vision 2030. The sector has been identified as one of the "Big Four" Agenda for the government that will facilitate the construction 500,000 affordable and decent housing units, creating employment, providing market for the manufacturers and building materials suppliers. It is anticipated that the successful implementation of the plan will raise the real estate and construction sectors contribution to GDP. The Plan outlines Policies, Reform Measures, Projects and Programmes that will be undertaken within the Plan Period. The Plan will play a critical role in creation of jobs for the youth and the achievement of the Demographic Dividend. The main goal of the Sector is to attain quality population with Adequate and Affordable Housing in a sustainable environment and well planned Urban Areas.

This Plan takes into account all Programmes and Projects that were initiated in the Second MTP as well as new projects that are key to effective implementation of the Vision 2030 and the "Big Four" Agenda. Priority areas planned include: harnessing demographic dividend; implementation of an Integrated Growth and Development Strategy for Nairobi Metropolitan Region (NMR) and five (5) other Metropolitan Regions (Mombasa, Kisumu-Kakamega, Nakuru-Eldoret, Wajir-Garissa-Mandera and Kitui-Mwingi-Meru) and implementation of the National Urban Development Policy through Kenya Urban Support Program (KUSP). Additional priority areas include development of Market Policy; installation of physical and social infrastructure in slums and informal settlements; facilitating access to decent housing; promotion of research and adoption of low cost Appropriate Building Materials and Technologies; audit and inspection of buildings to ensure their safety; and enhancing access to housing finance among others.

The attainment of the "Big Four" Agenda on housing will be anchored on effective development and implementation of relevant policies. Legal and institution reforms that would facilitate provision of more adequate housing to cater for the rising urban population. The implementation of the identified Programmes will require participation of all actors at both levels of Government, Private Sector and Development Partners.

PREFACE

The Rapid Population Growth Rate of 2.9% annually against an Economic Growth Rate of 5% annually has been of concern to Government due to and its implications on Socio-Economic Development. This Plan therefore, provides a Framework for the Government to effectively plan and manage its population and urbanization process for provision of adequate and decent housing.

The youthful population constitutes about 36% (15-35 years) of the total population and the Government will focus on harnessing its potential. The rate of urbanization is increasing at an annual rate of 8.3% resulting into high demand for housing, infrastructure and related amenities. To address the demand, the Sector will undertake the provision of solid and liquid waste management measures, access roads, Non-Motorized Transport (NMT), security lighting and security CCTVs among others to improve the lives of the urban citizens.

Over the years, the sector has experienced an acute shortage of affordable housing in urban areas and poor quality housing in rural areas. To address this trend, the Plan outlines Programmes and Projects that will facilitate the provision of at least 500,000 Affordable Housing Units through various initiatives and continued Upgrading of Informal Settlements.

To ensure successful implementation, the Plan will be monitored and evaluated through Annual Progress Reports within the framework of the National Integrated Monitoring and Evaluation System (NIMES).

In conclusion, I take this opportunity to appreciate the commitment of all those who participated in the preparation of this Plan. These include Officers in the State Department for Housing and Urban Development, National Council for Population and Development, Private Sector Partners, the Civil Society and the Development Partners. Special recognition goes to The National Treasury and Ministry of Planning for guidance and leadership in the preparation of this Plan.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Kenya's population is growing rapidly at an estimated annual rate of 2.7 per cent as at 2017. The population is projected to increase from 46.6 million in 2017 and to reach 50.8 million by 2022 thereby exerting pressure on agricultural land and available resources. Despite gains in devolution, there has been continued rural-urban migration in search of perceived better economic opportunities in the urban areas. The current proportion of urban population to the total population stands at 31.8% as at 2017. The increased urbanization has brought challenges on provision of adequate and affordable housing as well as associated infrastructure facilities, water and sanitation facilities.

This Plan builds on the priority areas of MTP II to manage the population growth, bridge housing supply gap and improve on urban management. During this Plan period, the Sector has identified the following programme and projects for implementation: Population Management, Population and Housing Census, Research on Emerging Population Issues, Planning and Development of Urban Infrastructure, Safety and Quality Audit of Buildings. In addition, it will facilitate the delivery of at least 500,000 housing units through various initiatives, Research and Development on Appropriate Building Materials and Technologies and Slum Improvement Programmes.

The Sector will also embark on policy and regulatory reforms that will facilitate implementation of the identified programmes in areas of Urban & Metropolitan Development and Management; National Building Maintenance; National Housing; Built Environment; Landlord and Tenant Relationship; National Slum Upgrading and Prevention; and establishment of Maintenance Fund.

The Plan has mainstreamed relevant targets under the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in implementation of programmes specifically SDG 11 on making Cities and Human Settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable. Underpinning the Plan is the Constitutional Mandate in Article 43(1) b, which states that every person has the right to accessible and adequate housing, and to reasonable standards of sanitation.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Kenya's population was estimated to be 46.6 million in 2017 and is projected to reach 50.8 million by 2022. The inter-censal growth rate of the population is estimated at 2.9 % while economic growth rate averaged 5.5% in the last five (5) years. Ideally, economic growth rate should be about three times the population growth rate to sustainably support the population. This therefore implies that the rapid increase in the population size is exerting pressure on economic opportunities, social amenities and natural resources.

The proportion of the country's urban population to the total population stands at 31.8% in 2017. In 2009, the urban population was about 12 million and this is projected to reach 16 million by 2022 based on the estimated inter-censal growth rate of 8.3%. Urbanization creates various challenges including demand for housing and associated infrastructure (i.e. access roads, Non-Motorized Transport (NMT) facilities, water and sanitation facilities and storm water drainage among others). The annual demand for housing in Kenya today is estimated at over 240,000 housing units. As demand surpasses supply, the units produced in the market become more unaffordable, particularly for the low-income segment of the population, and result in the mushrooming of slums. To address these challenges the Government has formulated various policies including the Population Policy for National Development, Sessional Paper No. 6 of 2016 on National Urban Development Policy, Sessional Paper No. 3 of 2016 on National Housing Policy and National Slum Upgrading and Prevention Policy among others.

During MTP III, the Sector will implement programmes and projects geared towards addressing the challenges of rapid population growth, urbanization, demand for housing and mushrooming of slums and informal settlements.

2.0 SITUATION ANALYSIS

2.1 Population




Figure 1: Population Trends and Projections 1948-2022

In 2017, the population was estimated at 46.6 million and projected to increase to 50.8 million by 2022 as shown in Figure 1. Fertility rate was projected at 3.8 children per woman in 2017 and is projected to decrease to 3.5 by 2022 while the crude death rate stood at 10.4 per 1,000 as shown in Table 1. High fertility in the past created a youthful population with 43% being below the age of 15 years leading to a high child dependency ratio. According to the 2009 Population and Housing census, the life expectancy was 58 years for males and 61 years for females in 2009 compared to 66.1 years for male and 72.8 years for female in 2017.

Notable decline in fertility and projected improvement in life expectancy is expected to result in age structural transition leading to the majority of the population being in the working age bracket i.e. 15 – 64 years. The large proportion of working age population and declining dependency will create a conducive environment for attainment of the demographic dividend and realization of the aspirations of Vision 2030. Older persons aged 65 years and above were 1.3 million in 2009 representing 3.5% of Kenya's population. Though the number of older persons continued to increase over the MTP II period, their proportion remained about the same and the trend is expected to continue over the MTP III period.

Table 2, shows the population projections by age cohorts for the period 2018 – 2022. The current population is estimated to be approximately 47.9 million and is projected to increase to 50.9 million by 2022. The youthful aged 15-34 years - population is 17.9 million and is projected to be 19.5 million by 2022.

2.2 Urbanization

According to the 2009 Census, the number of Kenyans living in urban areas stood at 12 million representing 31.8% of the population. Based on inter-censal urbanization rate of 8.3%, the projected urban population by 2022 will be 16 million. Kenya's urbanization rate is well below the global average of 50%, which is expected to rise to 60% by 2030 (United Nations, World Cities in 2016 Data Booklet).

To effectively plan for the rising urban population, the Government had planned during MTP II to finalize and implement the National Urban Development Policy aimed at streamlining development planning, land management, urban investment and delivery of infrastructure services.

2.3 Housing

The goal of government in MTP II was to facilitate production of 200,000 housing units annually through various initiatives and programmes. Affordability is a major constraint to the growth of the housing mortgage markets in Kenya and a key challenge in realizing access to adequate housing. Due to the rapid population growth, there has been increased demand for adequate and affordable housing especially in urban areas. Given the increasing demand, MTP III will focus on formulation of policies that would facilitate provision of more adequate housing to cater for the rising urban population. This will also be in line with the New Urban Agenda (NUA) where participatory planning and improvement of human settlements are key to sustainable urban areas.

2.4 Key Achievements

Key achievements realized during MTP II are summarized in Table 3 below.

3.0 EMERGING ISSUES, CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNT

3.1 Emerging issues

The following were emerging issues during the period:

- Demographic dividend as a means of addressing the myriad of socio-economic challenges in the African continent.
- Promotion of Population, Health and Environment (PHE) as an approach to sustainable development.
- Increasing number of older persons due to increasing life expectancy requiring higher social security and health insurance.
- Implementation of Africa's Agenda 2063, Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and New Urban Agenda (NUA) in relation to population, urbanization and housing.

3.2 Challenges

- Inadequate decent and affordable housing
- Increasing need for long-term home-care for the elderly and number of street children and families due to societal transition from extended to nucleus family.
- Rapid population growth rate in relation to available resources.
- An upsurge of the youth population (below 35 years) accounting for 64% of the total population in need of diverse services.
- Increased cases of teenage pregnancy inhibiting efforts to decrease maternal and infant morbidity and mortality.
- High dependency ratio.
- Low male participation in family planning and reproductive health.
- Increasing absolute numbers of the elderly with inadequate social support systems.
- Inadequate population data on some population subsets.
- Inadequate understanding of population and development inter-linkages.
- Politicization of population issues.
- Unabated urban sprawl without proper planning has made development of critical infrastructure complex and expensive.
- High cost of land compensation and resettlement.
- Inadequate information on market trends, best practices, optimal areas and risk assessment on real estate investment.
- Inaccessibility and rising cost of housing finance and building materials.
- High rural urban migration
- Inadequate support system for the street families

3.3 Lessons Learnt

- Strategic resource mobilization is key to implementing sustainable population programmes.
- Implementing population programmes requires a multi-sectoral approach due to their crosscutting nature.
- Programmes need to take into account the population dynamics in their planning and implementation.

- The demographic dividend provides an opportunity that can be harnessed to spur economic development.
- Addressing housing shortage for the low-income segment requires Government intervention as market forces lead to oversupply of housing for the high-end segment.
- Coordination of the housing sector requires a robust policy, legal, and regulatory framework.
- Integrated development planning (Spatial Plans, Sectoral Plans, Cities and Urban Plans) leads to well-planned cities and urban areas with the required services and amenities.
- Government intervention in partnership with other players is critical for the provision of affordable and decent houses

4.0 PROGRAMMES AND PROJECTS FOR 2018 – 2022

4.1 Flagship Programmes and Projects

Population

- Kenya Population and Housing Census 2019: The census will be conducted to provide
 data on various population and housingl indicators. This data will also form a basis
 for conducting further analysis on population variables and enhancing in-depth
 understanding of the population situation thereby supporting evidence-based planning and
 implementation of the population, housing and urbanization programmes.
- National Population Centre: A Population Centre will be set up and equipped to improve the
 institutional capacity to collate and analyze population and population related data
 to support evidence-based planning at both National and County levels. This will also entail
 improvement of technical and management skills for the effective management of
 the population programmes.

Urbanization

- Facilitation of 24 Hour Economy: This programme will be implemented through installation
 of street lighting, high mast security lights and Close Circuit Television cameras (CCTVs) in
 urban areas and Metropolitan Regions.
- Integrated Urban Development Planning: The programme will be implemented through detailed planning of: the 2 square-km radius around six (6) SGR railway termini; slum and informal settlement upgrading; planning of three (3) Border towns; dissemination of the National Urban Development Policy to counties; creation of an Urban Observatory Centre; and developing standards for urban land management and development control.
- Urban Renewal Programmes: The programme will be implemented through: economic
 opportunities development, improved water supply; sewerage collection and treatment;
 recreational facilities, security and leisure facilities' development; roads connectivity
 development; solid waste collection and disposal; market trade areas/cold storage/
 standardization and quality control; weigh bridges and planning, disaster management and
 social infrastructure development.
- Nairobi Metropolitan Services Improvement Project (NaMSIP): This project will entail
 improvement of railway stations, construction of markets, development of Integrated
 Urban Development Plans, construction of fire stations and purchase of fire engines,
 construction of trunk sewer lines and construction of storm water drainage systems.
- Urban Storm Water Infrastructure: The programme will involve construction of Narok Storm Water Drainage Phase II and construction of Kerugoya-Kutus Storm water drainage; It will also entail construction of vehicular bridges and footbridges crossing the storm water drainage; installation of security lighting at the crossing points for vehicular and pedestrian; and preliminary treatment of storm-water in case of discharge into sensitive water masses.

Housing

- Affordable Housing: The programme intends to facilitate various stakeholders and players in the sector to achieve delivery of at least 500,000 affordable houses. It will involve: construction of 400,000 affordable housing units; construction of 100,000 social housing units; completion of 462 housing units at Mavoko; construction of 30,000 housing units by Co-operative Movement; construction of 7,394 housing Units for National Police and Kenya Prison Services; construction of 10,400 housing units under the Civil Servants Housing Scheme; facilitation of 1,220 Civil Servants with Mortgage; Redevelopment of Soweto East Zone "B" at Kibera, Nairobi; refurbishment of 12,400 Government pool housing units; refurbishment of staff houses in 10 State Houses and Lodges; and replacement of asbestos roofs in 4,000 government housing units.
- Development and Implementation of Housing Finance Initiatives: The objective
 of the programme is to develop housing sector incentives that will stimulate private sector
 contribution to housing delivery. This program will also create the National Housing
 Development Fund that will facilitate finance for home owners in the affordable housing
 segment as well as a Maintenance and Redevelopment Fund that will create and facilitate
 steady flow of financing for maintenance of government houses.
- Research and Development on Appropriate Building Materials and Technologies
 (ABMT): This will entail collaborative research, documentation and technology transfer on
 building and construction materials; training of 20,000 new trainees on ABMT; dissemination
 of appropriate building materials and technologies; and development of 20 ABMT Centres.
- Development of Physical and Social Infrastructure in Slums and Informal Settlements in Selected Urban Areas: The programme will improve security of tenure and invest in social and physical infrastructural facilities based on plans developed in consultation with the communities. A database of informal settlements will be established to capture socioeconomic dynamics. Periodic mapping and monitoring of the slum dynamics will also be undertaken to ensure that upgrading efforts solve needs of residents.
- Implementation of Kenya Informal Settlement Improvement Project (KISIP) II:
 Implementation of KISIP II (World Bank funded) will cover informal settlements in 33 counties that did not benefit under KISIP I. Projects to be implemented include access roads, foot paths, security floodlighting masts, sewerage systems, storm water drainage, water connections and sanitation facilities.
- Buildings' Safety and Compliance: This will entail a comprehensive audit of buildings
 including those under construction throughout the country to establish their structural safety
 and compliance with building requirements and regulations such as access by Persons with
 Disabilities (PWDs), fire safety facilities among others. The programme targets inspection and
 auditing of 12,000 buildings and testing of 280 buildings.

4.2 Other Programmes and Projects

Population

- Advocacy on Population and Development Issues: Advocacy and awareness creation on
 population and development issues to sensitize politicians, opinion leaders, the private sector
 at national and devolved levels and other stakeholders to spur them into action in support of
 population initiatives.
- Research on Population and Development Issues: Quality population data and

- information will be generated and provided through research. Information generated on population issues will form a basis for effective and evidence-based decision-making.
- Development of the State of Kenya Population Annual Reports: The reports will provide data and information to policymakers and programme implementers on population and development issues.
- Partnerships on Population and Development: Enhance establishment of partnerships and coalitions to mobilize resources and capacity building for population and development issues.
- Demographic Dividend Roadmap: The implementation of the demographic dividend roadmap map will be coordinated to harness the youth potential for socio-economic transformation.

Urbanization

- Kenya Urban Support Programme (KUSP): The programme objective is to establish and strengthen urban institutions to deliver improved infrastructure and services in participating counties in Kenya. It is one of the strategies for the implementation of the Kenya Urban Programme (KenUP), which is the broad based Government's development strategy under the Kenya National Urban Development Policy (NUDP). KUSP is a combined Investment Lending and Performance for Results (P4R) Programme. The Programme targets 59 Municipalities and the total amount is US\$ 300 million for both human capacity and infrastructural development.
- Urban Mass Transport Infrastructure: This includes development of terminal facilities (Bus/ Lorry Park), access roads, missing link roads, high mast lighting and street lighting, improvement of railway stations, and Non-Motorized Transport (NMT).
- Solid Waste Management Infrastructure: The main component of this programme
 includes development of projects on solid waste separation at source, solid waste
 treatment plants, collection network infrastructure improvement, collection capacity
 improvement, transfer stations development, intermediate treatment, final disposal,
 and security lighting along the collection network.
- Water and Sewerage Infrastructure: The programme entails urban wastewater (sewerage)
 collection, treatment and reuse, generation of by-products, and disposal of solid waste from
 sewerage.
- Urban Disaster and Safety Management: The programme will be implemented through
 establishment of fire and rescue training centres, fire and rescue simulators, provision of
 fire fighting and rescue equipment, and establishment of six (6) modernly equipped
 fire stations across the country.
- Urban Social Infrastructure: The programme will involve development of markets as well as modern recreation and waterfront facilities.
- Securing Reclaimed Urban Space: This will entail securing, re-development and protection
 of reclaimed urban spaces (riparian reserves and wetlands) for recreational purposes.

Housing

Establishment of National Housing Database: This programme entails establishment of a
National Housing Database that will provide informed guidance and accurate data on
the sector as well as act as a one-stop real estate advisory centre. The National Housing
Database will provide housing sector data, information on market trends, best practices

- and risk assessment on real estate investment. M&E will be strengthened and institutionalized to ensure that the expected outputs and desired impacts are realized.
- Coordination and Implementation of National and International Agenda on Housing and Human Settlements: The programme will coordinate the implementation and reporting on National and International Agenda on Housing through the Human Settlement Secretariat.
- Applied Research on Building and Construction Materials: This program will entail
 research, testing, and documentation on building and construction materials as well
 as coordination of the green building agenda in relation to climate change.

5.0 POLICY, LEGAL AND INSTITUTIONAL REFORMS

5.1 Population

- a. Anchoring National Council for Population and Development under an Act of Parliament to strengthen coordination of programmes.
- b. Developing Population, Health and Environment Policy to promote an integrated approach to development planning.
- c. Establishment of a National Population Centre.

5.2 Urbanization

- a. Implementation of the National Urban Development Policy.
- b. Development of standards for urban land management and development control.
- c. Formulation of Metropolitan Areas Policy and Bill to operationalize six (6) Metropolitan Areas namely Nairobi, Mombasa, Kisumu-Kakamega, Nakuru-Eldoret, Wajir-Garissa-Mandera, and Kitui-Mwingi-Meru.
- d. Review and harmonization of the existing policy, legal, regulatory and institutional framework governing urbanization.
- e. Enactment of Urban Areas and Cities Amendment Bill 2015.
- f. Establishment of Urban Observatory Centre.

5.3 Housing

- Develop policy on lowering the cost of housing and improving accessibility to affordable mortgage.
- b. Develop policy on increasing availability of low cost funds from public and private sectors for investment in large scale housing production
- c. Formulation, enactment and implementation of the National Building Maintenance Policy, Housing Bill, Built Environment Bill, Building Surveyors' Bill, Landlord & Tenant Bill, and Kenya Building Research Institute Bill.
- d. Establishment of the National Housing Development Fund.
- e. Establishment of Maintenance and Redevelopment Fund for Government houses.
- f. Review and implementation of the National Housing Policy (2004).
- g. Ilmplementation of National Slum Upgrading and Prevention Policy (2016).
